Racially Affirming Books for Asian American Pacific Islander Children and Families

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Rationale

In tangent to our 2020 book list, "Racially Affirming Books for Black Children," the Center on the Ecology

of Early Development (CEED) has curated the CEED 2021 book list, "Racially Affirming Books for Asian

American Pacific Islander (AAPI) Children and Families" to promote literacy and racial identity in the AAPI community. The Covid-19 pandemic forced the world into lockdown but despite self-isolation across racial and ethnic groups, the AAPI community experienced increased exposure to racial hate crimes and attacks. The Center for the Study of Hate and Extremism found that Anti- Asian Hate Crimes surged 145%, while overall hate crimes dropped 6% in 2020. Large metropolitan cities like New York City and Los Angeles experienced an increase of 833% and 114% in Anti-Asian Hate Crimes respectively. In response to heightened levels of discrimination among the AAPI community, our scholars at CEED have passionately used our expertise in children's language and literacy development to curate a list of books featuring the full humanity of AAPI children. Our goal was to increase awareness of children's books that feature AAPI children as main characters who show a wide range of emotions, ideas, and identities, and who are learning about how their stories connect with others. We aim to provide educators, researchers, librarians, and AAPI families with literacy resources to encourage racial conversations, promote racial identity, a love of reading, and exposure to different perspectives, cultures, and backgrounds.

Sources for Curation

We want to acknowledge the incredible sources that guided our book curation process. We compiled our list by soliciting staff recommendations and selecting books from Lee and Low and YouTube read alouds from The Room 110 Show. For a full listing of AAPI children's books from these sources, please visit their respective sites. We selected books based on the Asian Pacific Institute on Gender Based Violence's definition of AAPI. To create our list, we reviewed the prior lists, adding additional recently published books and books from our personal libraries. The list was first sorted to contain books that had read-alouds on YouTube for further analysis and ensure final books were accessible to all. The books were checked to see if it was written by an AAPI author. All final books featured at least one of the following three criteria: (1) books that instill cultural pride, (2) depict children in their full humanity demonstrating the diversity in AAPI Children's abilities, personalities, and emotion, and (3) illustrate children overcoming bias or being protected from bias.
