How is this project funded?	How long will this project last?
The Center on the Ecology of Early Development (CEED) at Boston University has received a generous grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation to partner with Multnomah County Preschool for All.	The initial phase of the project is for two years, but we hope to extend the work in the future.
What are families being asked to do?	What are providers being asked to do?
Families will be invited to participate in surveys and focus groups. Families will also be asked to provide permission for their children to be observed during regular classroom activities. The information collected through these observations will be used to help teachers best support the children in their classrooms.	Providers will be invited to participate in surveys and focus groups. They will also be asked to have regular classroom activities observed to better understand activities in PFA classrooms. The information from the observations will also be used to help teachers best support children in their classrooms.
What are the main goals of the project?	What have we done so far?

- Support and study how racial equity is being centered in program design and delivery


In 2022-2023, we conducted interviews with community members, surveys for families and PFA pilot sites, and piloted classroom observations.

In 2023-2024, we are conducting focus groups, surveys, classroom observations and leading a community of practice focused on equity.
